Flight Patterns at West Houston Airport

There has been two prominent recent mid-air collisions in traffic patterns. One was at the North Las Vegas Airport and the other was at Watsonville Airport in California. I am familiar with both airports as I have flown in and out of each one. The North Las Vegas Airport is a towered airport. The controllers there are very careful to require perfect read backs of clearances and instructions.

In the North Las Vegas crash, a Piper Malibu Jet Prop ran into a Cessna doing touch and go's on an adjacent parallel runway. The controller made all the right calls by continuing to tell the Piper that he was landing on runway 30L. The read back by the Piper pilots (two pros on board) was always correct, but despite this, the Piper pilot lined up with runway 30R. As this occurred the Cessna was making its base leg into 30R for which he was cleared to land, when the Piper collided with the Cessna, killing all four occupants of both aircraft. This was a tragedy that should not have happened, but why did it? What was it that caused the Piper to line up with the wrong runway in daylight VFR weather conditions? Also, did the Piper have ADSB In? What happened to the information supposedly displayed on the GPS? Did the Piper get an alert? Maybe he only had out? Did the Piper review the approach chart and airport diagram before getting to the airport? Had he reviewed the chart, certainly he would have lined up with the correct runway. And why didn't his copilot speak up? All these are questions that we have no answers for.

The other crash occurred at a non-towered airport, Watsonville, California. A Cessna 340 going 180 kits. (including headwind), and bound and determined to make a straight in landing, called out his intentions over and over while a Cessna 150 was performing touch and go's in the left hand traffic pattern. Both planes made announcements and the Cessna 150 saw the Cessna 340 close to the last moment as he announced his go around. The Cessna 340 then plowed into the Cessna 150 from the rear at a higher speed then his landing gear extension speed! Why did this happen. One thing is for certain in this scenario is that the Cessna 340 pilot was going to make a straight in to the airport's active runway, no matter what. Did the 340 have ADSB in? Did he get an alert? We don't know this now, but maybe will have some answers next year.

At West Houston, we discourage straight in landings. We encourage working into the pattern and giving way to others already established in the pattern. I am also a believer in communication and having traffic verified both visually and on the GPS or other equipment available to you.

As this is written, the Airport intends to more often, remind pilots performing straight in's that they MUST give way to other aircraft in the pattern at IWS. Many times, when there is little or no traffic, particularly at night, a straight in can be safely accomplished. This also means communications and planning so that no other plane has to give way to such pilots that are intent on flying straight in.

Use of West Houston Airport means compliance with its rules and FAR's which state that pilots should follow the flow of traffic and that both straight in's and right patterns at airports with left hand patterns is not appropriate.

When making a straight in to West Houston, use the phrase "Straight in as traffic permits", or "Straight in but giving way to others in the pattern". Always be ready to abandon the straight in for a go around and entry into the pattern as depicted in the airport's approved "best practices" traffic pattern procedures.


