SMALL UAS RULES TAKE EFFECT

New rules for operating unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) weighing less than 55 pounds take effect Aug. 29, marking a big step forward in integrating drones into the National Airspace System.

"The new rules will make drone operations more predictable and consistent while making it easier for operators to understand and comply with FAA requirements, and that's good news for both manned

and unmanned aircraft," said Melissa Rudinger, AOPA vice president of government affairs. "UAS have a big role to play in the future of aviation, and the enactment of these rules is an important step toward ensuring aircraft of all types can safely share

The 40 Anniversary of the NASA Form, Safety Depends on Lessons Learned

On April 16, 2016, the NASA Aviation Safety Reporting System (ASRS) celebrated its 40th year of continuous operation in service to aviation safety.

The ASRS is an important facet of the continuing effort by government, industry, and individuals to maintain and improve aviation safety. The ASRS collects voluntarily submitted aviation safety incident/situation reports from pilots, controllers, and others.

The ASRS acts on the information these reports contain. It identifies system deficiencies, and issues alerting messages to persons in a position to correct them. It educates through its newsletter CALLBACK, its journal ASRS Directline and through its research studies. Its database is a public repository which serves the FAA and NASA's needs

derive from performing their duties to perfection.

Pride is a dead stick landing (no power) directly on numbers by a Citabria pilot.

Pride to one local CFI is knowing the 'numbers' of all the different kinds of airplanes he flies, maintaining those numbers throughout the flight profile, and holding headings/ altitudes despite the challenges presented by mother nature.

Pride to another pilot is holding the centerline when he taxies. It's a life lesson taught by his father. It's there for a reason!

And then there is the checklist. Do you take pride in your careful use of the checklist, or is it just something you 'do' without think-ing?

Consequently, just ask the pilot next to you where is his pride? A Baron pilot was getting excited remembering the time he maintained his goal. Which was to make a short landing on a large runway at a busy airport as if he was flying a Cessna 172. He made the first turn off with ease!

Take pride in your flying. Do what you set out to accomplish....even when you're flying solo. Strive to fly the best you can. Don't be satisfied with 'good enough'.

Take pride in everything you do and you will achieve your goals. What gives you pride ?

The rule, known as Part 107, means drone operators will no longer need to go through the FAA exemption process to use small UAS for a range of commercial operations and activities that are not for a hobby or recreational purpose. Small UAS operators who have received a Section 333 exemption will be allowed to continue operating under the terms of their exemption or they may choose to operate under Part 107 with proper certification. Recreational and hobby users will not be affected by the new rule.

Under the new rule, the person operating a UAS is known as a "remote pilot" and will need to obtain a "remote pilot certificate with a small UAS rating." A person operating a small UAS will be required to hold the certificate or operate under the direct supervision of an individual who does.

In order to obtain a remote pilot certificate, applicants must be vetted by the Transportation Security Administration; be at least 16 years old; and demonstrate aeronautical knowledge, either by passing an FAA initial aeronautical knowledge test, or for those who already have an FAA-issued pilot certificate other than a student pilot certificate and have completed a flight review within the previous 24 months, by completing a small UAS online training course.

Additional details on how to obtain a remote pilot certificate with a small UAS rating are available in AOPA's Guide to Remote Pilot Certification.

and those of other organizations world-wide which are engaged in research and the promotion of safe flight.

Purpose

The ASRS collects, analyzes, and responds to voluntarily submitted aviation safety incident reports in order to lessen the likelihood of aviation accidents.

ASRS data are used to:

Identify deficiencies and discrepancies in the National Aviation System (NAS) so that these can be remedied by appropriate authorities.

Support policy formulation and planning for, and improvements to, the NAS.

Strengthen the foundation of aviation human factors safety research. This is particularly important since it is generally conceded that over two-thirds of all aviation accidents and incidents have their roots in human performance errors.
